





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Conclusions Poly-functional zoning must be recognized as one of the instruments for realising the idea of sustainable and balanced development; Therefore the principles of sustainable development should be functional complexity, but not to merely poly-functional or merely mono-functional zones; Overuse of the urban territory should be understood not only ecological, but as social systems that are affected by metabolistic urban streams; The urban streams can be seen as the movement of matter in the territory, which influences the positioning of the poly-functional zones and forms functional zones properties, also determines usage priorities in the territory.
